October will mark the 25th anniversary of The Ultimate Dream Home campaign for CHHA Sudbury Branch.

The main source of funding for the registered charity, the Dream Home Draw changed the organization in more ways than can be counted.

"We've come such a long way," says Executive Director (ED) Kim Scott. "We've put our hearts and souls into this campaign and it's paid off, thanks in large part to the people of Sudbury — and, indeed, Northern Ontario — who have supported us and our cause for 25 years."

Scott, who has been Executive Director since the beginning of the campaign and says the organization has seen many changes over the years — all for the better. "It's just continued to get better and bigger every year," she added.

The campaign runs

each year from mid-October until early January, culminating with the draw in early February. Because tickets are distributed and available for purchase at various locations throughout North Eastern Ontario, it is a herculean effort to have them all returned, counted, deposited and audited before the draw date, while maintaining regular every-day business around the office — especially when you consider there are just 4 employees, including Scott.

Gwen MacGillivray, Susan Arthur and Joe Stacknik have been part of the team for 20 plus years.

One thing that hasn't changed — and it's an important one — is the price of the tickets. They are still just \$20, which is a feat in itself.

Hearing Loss Lessons We <u>Must</u> Learn for Ourselves

When do we finally *get* what it means to have hearing loss? When it happens to us.

When do we learn how to live well with it? When we're ready and when we really *want* to. Which may be very soon, sometime soon, or never.

Recently I gave a presentation on hearing loss in the community where I live. Basic stuff - types of hearing loss, how many of us have it, how many of us are *going* to have it, what to do when we suspect we *might* have it, what hearing aids can and cannot do, and other assistive technology and behaviours that can help.

I worried that the audience would be bored – I mean, *surely*, they must already know at least some of what I was talking about. You can't open a newspaper or social media without seeing a hearing aid advertisement or go to a social event without seeing half the people

sporting hearing aids or at least *needing* them.

I also knew most of the 20 audience members, and suspected they had come to the presentation, sponsored by the Canadian Hard of Hearing Association, just to be nice to me.

I was shocked – at how *not* bored they were and their limited knowledge of strategies that would improve their life. Many had their hearing aids with them, although not necessarily in their ears. A few were in the early stages of exploring hearing aids and gripped by classic denial. "I'm not sure if I really need them." "I've heard they make social situations even worse, with the noise and all."

One woman told me that she had a lot of questions for me. All of them boiled down to "Which hearing aid brand should I get?" She was in knots, thinking she had to arrive at the audiologist with her choice already made, as if she were choosing a brand of toilet or flooring and only

needed a bit of advice from a salesperson.

This was the first time anyone in the audience had attended a talk on hearing loss. After 30 years, and even in this age of mass information and social media and widespread hearing loss, I was answering the same questions asked by any person facing hearing difficulties. Some people just never ask the questions out loud.

Why am I still struggling to hear? My audiologist said I don't have to wear them all the time. Should I get a different brand, or go to a different clinic? People leave me out of conversations.

The hearing loss

journey is personal. It starts when it starts and the direction it takes is up to you.

True understanding of what it's like to have hearing loss occurs only when it happens to you.

Learning how to live the best possible life with hearing loss only occurs when you want to learn... because you sense that something could be better or different with your hearing landscape.

Hearing care professionals (backed by science, training and expertise) will serve you best when you ask lots of questions, when they listen to you, answer your questions, and you listen to them. Also, when they ask you lots of

questions and when you listen to *them*. THEN, it's a good idea to compare notes and make sure you're on the right path.

Other people with hearing loss are great companions to commiserate over the crap that hearing loss can dish up.

Other people with successful lived experience can be a positive force – if you let them.

These are the hearing loss lessons we learn on our own schedule. They all start with asking a question.

Device Lending Library has been replenished

CHHA National receives \$2.5 million grant

Fostering Inclusive Communities for Seniors

In July of this year, the Canadian Hard of Hearing Association (CHHA) National Office announced that they had received \$2.5 million in funding to launch a five-year initiative: Fostering Inclusive Communities for Seniors (FICS) with Hearing Loss.

The FICS Project is devoted to supporting a demographic often marginalized in health discourse: seniors with hearing loss from underrepresented communities. This includes a diverse and vibrant spectrum of individuals: immigrants who have made Canada their new home, newcomers still navigating the complexities of resettlement. BIPOC individuals who face the intersection of racial and age related disparities, Indigenous peoples carrying the weight of historical injustices, LGBTQ+ seniors who often confront social stigma, and seniors living with disabilities who encounter multifaceted barriers in their daily lives. "Canada is a better country when pillars of our communities are adequately supported.

That is why the New Horizons for Seniors Program is so important in helping seniors across the country access services they need. Local organizations like the Canadian Hard of Hearing Association know best what their needs are, to ensure seniors are connected, supported, and included in their communities.

"This program promotes social inclusion, enhances quality of life, and supports seniors to age with the dignity they deserve," said the Honourable Patty Hajdu, Minister of Jobs and Families and Minister responsible for the Federal Economic Development Agency for Northern Ontario.

This \$2.5M initiative will involve working collaboratively with nine (9) not -forprofit community partners who serve the senior community. By acknowledging and addressing these multifaceted barriers, the FICS Project seeks to create pathways for these seniors to reengage with their communities, access necessary resources,

and enjoy the social connections that enrich human life.

According to Ann McSweeney, CHHA National's Executive Director (ED), the aim is to restore opportunities for interaction, collaboration, and contribution, reinforcing the fabric of an inclusive society that values all its members. "This funding is a significant recognition of the challenges faced by seniors with hearing loss," she said. "It

allows us to create targeted, sustainable solutions that foster genuine inclusion. We are deeply grateful to the Government of Canda and the New Horizons for Seniors Program for partnering with us to ensure the voices of hard of hearing seniors are heard and their needs are met within communities."

The FICS Program began in March 2025 and will conclude February 2030
